1. You are requested to submit a proposal for the provision of a Specialist Organization to conduct Media Training Program during the next presidential and provincial council in Afghanistan, as per enclosed Terms of Reference (TOR).
2. All proposals are subject to the Instructions to Offerors and such other provisions, specifications and instructions as are attached or incorporated herein by reference (hereinafter collectively called " Request for Proposal" or "RFP"). Solicitation documents hereunder include:

If you request information, we would endeavor to provide information expeditiously, but any delay in providing such information will not be considered a reason for extending the submission date of your proposal.
5. If the proposal is sent by email, it can be done **only** at the following address: procurement.elect@undp.org in two different emails clearly indicating the reference number of the RFP and the content of the documents: "technical proposal" OR "financial proposal". The email file size MUST be limited to 3MB. Any files over 3MB MUST be split and sent as separate emails, clearly marked "email 1 of 2", "email 2 of 2".



6. Your submission will be considered upon the provision with this RFP the following, failure in providing the requested documents may grounds for disqualification of the Offeror.

 - Minimum of three years of experience in the relevant field
 - Reference list (Client list)
7. The recipients of this RFP are requested to acknowledge receipt of this solicitation document and any amendments thereto to UNDP/ELECT Afghanistan by completing the Annex VI acknowledgement letter. The acknowledgement letter must be signed stamped and should be sent via email to procurement.elect@undp.org five days after receipt of this RFP.
8. A conference will be held on Monday 30 March 2009 at 11.00 am in ELECT conference room in UNDP, to familiarize the Offerors with the requirements. The representatives of the Offerors MUST for security purposes notify UNDP of their intention to attend the conference the day before. The representatives of the Offerors are requested to reach UNDP compound Main Gate at 10.50 am on the stipulated date.

Annex I-Instructions to Offerors

A. Introduction

1. General

Purpose of RFP: Provision of a Specialist Organization to conduct Media Training Program during the next presidential and provincial council in Afghanistan as per enclosed Terms of Reference (TOR).

2. Cost of proposal

The Offeror shall bear all costs associated with the preparation and submission of the Proposal, the UNDP will in no case be responsible or liable for those costs, regardless of the conduct or outcome of the solicitation.

B. Solicitation Documents

3. Contents of solicitation documents

Proposals must offer services for the total requirement. Proposals offering only part of the requirement will be rejected. The Offeror is expected to examine all corresponding instructions, forms, terms and specifications contained in the Solicitation Documents. Failure to comply with these documents will be at the Offeror's risk and may affect the evaluation of the Proposal.

4. Clarification of solicitation documents

A prospective Offeror requiring any clarification of the Solicitation Documents may notify the procuring UNDP entity in writing at the organization's mailing address or fax number indicated in the RFP. The procuring UNDP entity will respond in writing to any request for clarification of the Solicitation Documents that it receives earlier than two weeks prior to the deadline for the submission of Proposals. Written copies of the organization's response (including an explanation of the query but without identifying the source of inquiry) will be sent to all prospective Offerors that has received the Solicitation Documents.

5. Amendments of solicitation documents

At any time prior to the deadline for submission of Proposals, the procuring UNDP entity may, for any reason, whether at its own initiative or in response to a clarification requested by a prospective Offeror, modify the Solicitation Documents by amendment.

All prospective Offerors that have received the Solicitation Documents will be notified in writing of all amendments to the Solicitation Documents.



In order to afford prospective Offerors reasonable time in which to take the amendments into account in preparing their offers, the procuring UNDP entity may, at its discretion, extend the deadline for the submission of Proposals.

C. Preparation of Proposals

6. Language of the proposal

The Proposals prepared by the Offeror and all correspondence and documents relating to the Proposal exchanged by the Offeror and the procuring UNDP entity shall be written in the English/French/Spanish language. Any printed literature furnished by the Offeror may be written in another language so long as accompanied by an English translation of its pertinent passages in which case, for purposes of interpretation of the Proposal, the English translation shall govern.

7. Documents comprising the proposal

The Proposal shall comprise the following components:

- (a) Proposal submission form;
- (b) Operational and technical part of the Proposal, including documentation to demonstrate that the Offeror meets all requirements;
- (c) Price schedule, completed in accordance with clauses 8 and 9;
- (d) organizational profile, track record and proposed key staff CVs



8. Proposal form

The Offeror shall structure the operational and technical part of its Proposal as follows:

(a) Management plan

This section should provide corporate orientation to include the year and state/country of incorporation and a brief description of the Offeror's present activities. It should focus on services related to the Proposal.

This section should also describe the organisational unit(s) that will become responsible for the contract, and the general management approach towards a project of this kind. The Offeror should comment on its experience in similar projects and identify the person(s) representing the Offeror in any future dealing with the procuring UNDP entity.

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(b) Resource plan

This should fully explain the Offeror’s resources in terms of personnel and facilities necessary for the performance of this requirement. It should describe the Offeror’s current capabilities/facilities and any plans for their expansion.

(c) Proposed methodology

This section should demonstrate the Offeror’s responsiveness to the specification by identifying the specific components proposed, addressing the requirements, as specified, point by point; providing a detailed description of the essential performance characteristics proposed warranty; and demonstrating how the proposed methodology meets or exceeds the specifications.

The operational and technical part of the Proposal should not contain any pricing information whatsoever on the services offered. Pricing information shall be separated and only contained in the appropriate Price Schedules.

It is mandatory that the Offeror’s Proposal numbering system corresponds with the numbering system used in the body of this RFP. All references to descriptive material and brochures should be included in the appropriate response paragraph, though material/documents themselves may be provided as annexes to the Proposal/response.

Information which the Offeror considers proprietary, if any, should be clearly marked “proprietary” next to the relevant part of the text and it will then be treated as such accordingly.


(d) Quality Assurance Mechanism which will be put in place, how quality can be assured, or is guaranteed, by the Offeror.

9. Proposal prices

The Offeror shall indicate on an appropriate Price Schedule, an example of which is contained in these Solicitation Documents, the prices of services it proposes to supply under the contract.

10. Proposal currencies

All prices shall be quoted in US dollars or any convertible currency.

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11. Period of validity of proposals

Proposals shall remain valid for one hundred and twenty (120) days after the date of Proposal submission prescribed by the procuring UNDP entity, pursuant to the deadline clause. A Proposal valid for a shorter period may be rejected by the procuring UNDP entity on the grounds that it is non-responsive.

In exceptional circumstances, the procuring UNDP entity may solicit the Offeror’s consent to an extension of the period of validity. The request and the responses thereto shall be made in writing. An Offeror granting the request will not be required nor permitted to modify its Proposal.

12. Format and signing of proposals

The Offeror shall prepare two copies of the Proposal, clearly marking each “Original Proposal” and “Copy of Proposal” as appropriate. In the event of any discrepancy between them, the original shall govern.

The two copies of the Proposal shall be typed or written in indelible ink and shall be signed by the Offeror or a person or persons duly authorized to bind the Offeror to the contract. The latter authorization shall be indicated by written power-of-attorney accompanying the Proposal.

A Proposal shall contain no interlineations, erasures, or overwriting except, as necessary to correct errors made by the Offeror, in which case such corrections shall be initialed by the person or persons signing the Proposal.

13. Payment

UNDP shall effect payments to the Contractor after acceptance by UNDP of the invoices submitted by the contractor, upon achievement of the corresponding milestones.

B. Submission of Proposals



14. Sealing and marking of proposals

The Offeror shall seal the Proposal in one outer and two inner envelopes, as detailed below.

- (b) Both inner envelopes shall indicate the name and address of the Offeror. The first inner envelope shall contain the information specified in Clause 8 (*Proposal form*) above, with the copies duly marked “Original” and “Copy”. The second inner envelope shall include the price schedule duly identified as such.

Note, if the inner envelopes are not sealed and marked as per the instructions in this clause, the procuring UNDP entity will not assume responsibility for the Proposal’s misplacement or premature opening.

15. Deadline for submission of proposals

Proposals must be received by the UNDP ELECT project at the address specified under clause *Sealing and marking of Proposals* no later than **April 6th 2009 at 4 pm (16.00) Kabul local time.**

The procuring UNDP entity may, at its own discretion extend this deadline for the submission of Proposals by amending the solicitation documents in accordance with clause *Amendments of Solicitation Documents*, in which case all rights and obligations of the procuring UNDP ELECT project and Offerors previously subject to the deadline will thereafter be subject to the deadline as extended.



16. Late Proposals

Any Proposal received by the procuring UNDP entity after the deadline for submission of proposals, pursuant to clause *Deadline for the submission of proposals*, will be rejected.

17. Modification and withdrawal of Proposals

The Offeror may withdraw its Proposal after the Proposal’s submission, provided that written notice of the withdrawal is received by the procuring UNDP entity prior to the deadline prescribed for submission of Proposals.

The Offeror’s withdrawal notice shall be prepared, sealed, marked, and dispatched in accordance with the provisions of clause *Deadline for Submission of Proposals*. The

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withdrawal notice may also be sent by telex or fax but followed by a signed confirmation copy.

No Proposal may be modified subsequent to the deadline for submission of proposals.

No Proposal may be withdrawn in the Interval between the deadline for submission of proposals and the expiration of the period of proposal validity specified by the Offeror on the Proposal Submission Form.

E. Opening and Evaluation of Proposals

18. Opening of proposals

The procuring entity will open the Proposals in the presence of a Committee formed by the Head of the procuring UNDP entity.

19. Clarification of proposals


To assist in the examination, evaluation and comparison of Proposals, the Purchaser may at its discretion, ask the Offeror for clarification of its Proposal. The request for clarification and the response shall be in writing and no change in price or substance of the Proposal shall be sought, offered or permitted.

20. Preliminary examination

The Purchaser will examine the Proposals to determine whether they are complete, whether any computational errors have been made, whether the documents have been properly signed, and whether the Proposals are generally in order.

Arithmetical errors will be rectified on the following basis: If there is a discrepancy between the unit price and the total price that is obtained by multiplying the unit price and quantity, the unit price shall prevail and the total price shall be corrected. If the Offeror does not accept the correction of errors, its Proposal will be rejected. If there is a discrepancy between words and figures the amount in words will prevail.

Prior to the detailed evaluation, the Purchaser will determine the substantial responsiveness of each Proposal to the Request for Proposals (RFP). For purposes of these Clauses, a substantially responsive Proposal is one which conforms to all the terms and conditions of the RFP without material deviations. The Purchaser's determination of a Proposal's responsiveness is based on the contents of the Proposal itself without recourse to extrinsic evidence.

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A Proposal determined as not substantially responsive will be rejected by the Purchaser and may not subsequently be made responsive by the Offeror by correction of the non-conformity.

21. Evaluation and comparison of proposals

A two-stage procedure is utilized in evaluating the proposals, with evaluation of the technical proposal being completed prior to any price proposal being opened and compared. The price proposal of the Proposals will be opened only for submissions that passed the minimum technical score of 70% of the obtainable score of 1000 points in the evaluation of the technical proposals.

The technical proposal is evaluated on the basis of its responsiveness to the Term of Reference (TOR).

In the Second Stage, the price proposal of all contractors, who have attained minimum 70% score in the technical evaluation, will be compared.

Final combined scoring of each Offeror will be on the basis of combined evaluation of technical score weighting 70% and the financial score weighting 30%. The maximum score obtainable for the price proposal is 100.

The award will be granted to **Offerors** achieving the highest combined score. The formula for determining the financial scores is the following:

$F_s = 100 \times F_1 / F_c$: F_s is the financial score; F_1 is the lowest price and F_c is the price of the proposal under consideration.

The weights given to the technical and financial proposals are: $T=0.7$, $F=0.3$

The highest score will be calculated by formula: $HS = T \times 0.7 + 0.3$

(HS = Highest Score, T_s = technical score, F_s = Financial score)

E. Award of Contract

22. Award criteria, award of contract

The procuring UNDP entity reserves the right to accept or reject any Proposal, and to annul the solicitation process and reject all Proposals at any time prior to award of contract, without thereby incurring any liability to the affected Offeror or any obligation to inform the affected Offeror or Offerors of the grounds for the Purchaser’s action

Prior to expiration of the period of proposal validity, the procuring UNDP entity will award the contract to the qualified Offeror whose Proposal after being evaluated is considered to be the most responsive to the needs of the organization and activity concerned.

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23. Purchaser’s right to vary requirements at time of award

The Purchaser reserves the right at the time of award of contract to vary the quantity of services and goods specified in the RFP without any change in price or other terms and conditions.

24. Signing of the contract

Within 30 days of receipt of the contract the successful Offeror shall sign and date the contract and return it to the Purchaser.

25. Performance security

Within 30 days of the receipt of the Contract from the Purchaser, the successful Offeror shall provide the performance security on the Performance Security Form provided in the Solicitation Documents and in accordance with the Special Conditions of Contract.

Failure of the successful Offeror to comply with the requirement of Clause 24 or Clause 25 shall constitute sufficient grounds for the annulment of the award and forfeiture of the Proposal security if any, in which event the Purchaser may make the award to the next lowest evaluated Offeror or call for new Proposals.



Annex II-General Conditions of Contract

1. LEGAL STATUS

The Contractor shall be considered as having the legal status of an independent contractor vis-à-vis UNDP. The Contractor's personnel and sub-contractors shall not be considered in any respect as being the employees or agents of UNDP or the United Nations.

2. SOURCE OF INSTRUCTIONS

The Contractor shall neither seek nor accept instructions from any authority external to UNDP in connection with the performance of its services under this Contract. The Contractor shall refrain from any action which may adversely affect UNDP or the United Nations and shall fulfil its commitments with the fullest regard to the interests of UNDP.

3. CONTRACTOR'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR EMPLOYEES

The Contractor shall be responsible for the professional and technical competence of its employees and will select, for work under this Contract, reliable individuals who will perform effectively in the implementation of this Contract, respect the local customs, and conform to a high standard of moral and ethical conduct.

4. ASSIGNMENT



The Contractor shall not assign, transfer, pledge or make other disposition of this Contract or any part thereof, or any of the Contractor's rights, claims or obligations under this Contract except with the prior written consent of UNDP.

5. SUB-CONTRACTING

In the event the Contractor requires the services of sub-contractors, the Contractor shall obtain the prior written approval and clearance of UNDP for all sub-contractors. The approval of UNDP of a sub-contractor shall not relieve the Contractor of any of its obligations under this Contract. The terms of any sub-contract shall be subject to and conform with the provisions of this Contract.

6. OFFICIALS NOT TO BENEFIT

The Contractor warrants that no official of UNDP or the United Nations has received or will be offered by the Contractor any direct or indirect benefit arising from this Contract or the award thereof. The Contractor agrees that breach of this provision is a breach of an essential term of this Contract.

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7. INDEMNIFICATION

The Contractor shall indemnify, hold and save harmless, and defend, at its own expense, UNDP, its officials, agents, servants and employees from and against all suits, claims, demands, and liability of any nature or kind, including their costs and expenses, arising out of acts or omissions of the Contractor, or the Contractor's employees, officers, agents or sub-contractors, in the performance of this Contract. This provision shall extend, inter alia, to claims and liability in the nature of workmen's compensation, products liability and liability arising out of the use of patented inventions or devices, copyrighted material or other intellectual property by the Contractor, its employees, officers, agents, servants or sub-contractors. The obligations under this Article do not lapse upon termination of this Contract.

8. INSURANCE AND LIABILITIES TO THIRD PARTIES

8.1 The Contractor shall provide and thereafter maintain insurance against all risks in respect of its property and any equipment used for the execution of this Contract.

8.2 The Contractor shall provide and thereafter maintain all appropriate workmen's compensation insurance, or its equivalent, with respect to its employees to cover claims for personal injury or death in connection with this Contract.

8.3 The Contractor shall also provide and thereafter maintain liability insurance in an adequate amount to cover third party claims for death or bodily injury, or loss of or damage to property, arising from or in connection with the provision of services under this Contract or the operation of any vehicles, boats, airplanes or other equipment owned or leased by the Contractor or its agents, servants, employees or sub-contractors performing work or services in connection with this Contract.



8.4 Except for the workmen's compensation insurance, the insurance policies under this Article shall:

- (i) Name UNDP as additional insured;
- (ii) Include a waiver of subrogation of the Contractor's rights to the insurance carrier against UNDP;
- (iii) Provide that UNDP shall receive thirty (30) days written notice from the insurers prior to any cancellation or change of coverage.

8.5 The Contractor shall, upon request, provide UNDP with satisfactory evidence of the insurance required under this Article.

C. 9. ENCUMBRANCES/LIENS

The Contractor shall not cause or permit any lien, attachment or other encumbrance by any person to be placed on file or to remain on file in any public office or on file with UNDP

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against any monies due or to become due for any work done or materials furnished under this Contract, or by reason of any other claim or demand against the Contractor.

10. TITLE TO EQUIPMENT

Title to any equipment and supplies that may be furnished by UNDP shall rest with UNDP and any such equipment shall be returned to UNDP at the conclusion of this Contract or when no longer needed by the Contractor. Such equipment, when returned to UNDP, shall be in the same condition as when delivered to the Contractor, subject to normal wear and tear. The Contractor shall be liable to compensate UNDP for equipment determined to be damaged or degraded beyond normal wear and tear.

11. COPYRIGHT, PATENTS AND OTHER PROPRIETARY RIGHTS

UNDP shall be entitled to all intellectual property and other proprietary rights including but not limited to patents, copyrights, and trademarks, with regard to products, or documents and other materials which bear a direct relation to or are produced or prepared or collected in consequence of or in the course of the execution of this Contract. At the UNDP's request, the Contractor shall take all necessary steps, execute all necessary documents and generally assist in securing such proprietary rights and transferring them to UNDP in compliance with the requirements of the applicable law.

12. USE OF NAME, EMBLEM OR OFFICIAL SEAL OF UNDP OR THE UNITED NATIONS

The Contractor shall not advertise or otherwise make public the fact that it is a Contractor with UNDP, nor shall the Contractor, in any manner whatsoever use the name, emblem or official seal of UNDP or the United Nations, or any abbreviation of the name of UNDP or the United Nations in connection with its business or otherwise.

13. CONFIDENTIAL NATURE OF DOCUMENTS AND INFORMATION

13.1 All maps, drawings, photographs, mosaics, plans, reports, recommendations, estimates, documents and all other data compiled by or received by the Contractor under this Contract shall be the property of UNDP, shall be treated as confidential and shall be delivered only to UNDP authorized officials on completion of work under this Contract.

13.2 The Contractor may not communicate at any time to any other person, Government or authority external to UNDP, any information known to it by reason of its association with UNDP which has not been made public except with the authorization of UNDP; nor shall the Contractor at any time use such information to private advantage. These obligations do not lapse upon termination of this Contract.



14. FORCE MAJEURE; OTHER CHANGES IN CONDITIONS

- 14.1 Force majeure, as used in this Article, means acts of God, war (whether declared or not), invasion, revolution, insurrection, or other acts of a similar nature or force which are beyond the control of the Parties.
- 14.2 In the event of and as soon as possible after the occurrence of any cause constituting force majeure, the Contractor shall give notice and full particulars in writing to UNDP, of such occurrence or change if the Contractor is thereby rendered unable, wholly or in part, to perform its obligations and meet its responsibilities under this Contract. The Contractor shall also notify UNDP of any other changes in conditions or the occurrence of any event which interferes or threatens to interfere with its performance of this Contract. The notice shall include steps proposed by the Contractor to be taken including any reasonable alternative means for performance that is not prevented by force majeure. On receipt of the notice required under this Article, UNDP shall take such action as, in its sole discretion, it considers to be appropriate or necessary in the circumstances, including the granting to the Contractor of a reasonable extension of time in which to perform its obligations under this Contract.
- 14.3 If the Contractor is rendered permanently unable, wholly, or in part, by reason of force majeure to perform its obligations and meet its responsibilities under this Contract, UNDP shall have the right to suspend or terminate this Contract on the same terms and conditions as are provided for in Article 15, "Termination", except that the period of notice shall be seven (7) days instead of thirty (30) days.

15. TERMINATION

- 15.1 Either party may terminate this Contract for cause, in whole or in part, upon thirty days notice, in writing, to the other party. The initiation of arbitral proceedings in accordance with Article 16 "Settlement of Disputes" below shall not be deemed a termination of this Contract.
- 15.2 UNDP reserves the right to terminate without cause this Contract at any time upon 15 days prior written notice to the Contractor, in which case UNDP shall reimburse the Contractor for all reasonable costs incurred by the Contractor prior to receipt of the notice of termination.
- 15.3 In the event of any termination by UNDP under this Article, no payment shall be due from UNDP to the Contractor except for work and services satisfactorily performed in conformity with the express terms of this Contract. The Contractor shall take immediate steps to terminate the work and services in a prompt and orderly manner and to minimize losses and further expenditures.
- 15.4 Should the Contractor be adjudged bankrupt, or be liquidated or become insolvent, or should the Contractor make an assignment for the benefit of its creditors, or should a Receiver be appointed on account of the insolvency of the Contractor, UNDP may, without prejudice to any other right or remedy it may have, terminate this Contract forthwith. The Contractor shall immediately inform UNDP of the occurrence of any of the above events.



16. SETTLEMENT OF DISPUTES

16.1. Amicable Settlement

The Parties shall use their best efforts to settle amicably any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of, or relating to this Contract or the breach, termination or invalidity thereof. Where the parties wish to seek such an amicable settlement through conciliation, the conciliation shall take place in accordance with the UNCITRAL Conciliation Rules then obtaining, or according to such other procedure as may be agreed between the parties.

16.2. Arbitration

Unless, any such dispute, controversy or claim between the Parties arising out of or relating to this Contract or the breach, termination or invalidity thereof is settled amicably under the preceding paragraph of this Article within sixty (60) days after receipt by one Party of the other Party's request for such amicable settlement, such dispute, controversy or claim shall be referred by either Party to arbitration in accordance with the UNCITRAL Arbitration Rules then obtaining, including its provisions on applicable law. The arbitral tribunal shall have no authority to award punitive damages. The Parties shall be bound by any arbitration award rendered as a result of such arbitration as the final adjudication of any such controversy, claim or dispute.

PRIVILEGES AND IMMUNITIES

Nothing in or relating to this Contract shall be deemed a waiver, express or implied, of any of the privileges and immunities of the United Nations, including its subsidiary organs.

TAX EXEMPTION

18.1 Section 7 of the Convention on the Privileges and Immunities of the United Nations provides, inter-alia, that the United Nations, including its subsidiary organs, is exempt from all direct taxes, except charges for public utility services, and is exempt from customs duties and charges of a similar nature in respect of articles imported or exported for its official use. In the event any governmental authority refuses to recognize the United Nations exemption from such taxes, duties or charges, the Contractor shall immediately consult with UNDP to determine a mutually acceptable procedure.

18.2 Accordingly, the Contractor authorizes UNDP to deduct from the Contractor's invoice any amount representing such taxes, duties or charges, unless the Contractor has consulted with UNDP before the payment thereof and UNDP has, in each instance, specifically authorized the Contractor to pay such taxes, duties or charges under protest. In that event, the Contractor shall provide UNDP with written evidence that payment of such taxes, duties or charges has been made and appropriately authorized.



19 CHILD LABOUR

19.1 The Contractor represents and warrants that neither it, nor any of its suppliers is engaged in any practice inconsistent with the rights set forth in the Convention on the Rights of the Child, including Article 32 thereof, which, inter alia, requires that a child shall be protected from performing any work that is likely to be hazardous or to interfere with the child's education, or to be harmful to the child's health or physical mental, spiritual, moral or social development.

19.2 Any breach of this representation and warranty shall entitle UNDP to terminate this Contract immediately upon notice to the Contractor, at no cost to UNDP.

MINES

20.1 The Contractor represents and warrants that neither it nor any of its suppliers is actively and directly engaged in patent activities, development, assembly, production, trade or manufacture of mines or in such activities in respect of components primarily utilized in the manufacture of Mines. The term "Mines" means those devices defined in Article 2, Paragraphs 1, 4 and 5 of Protocol II annexed to the Convention on Prohibitions and Restrictions on the Use of Certain Conventional Weapons Which May Be Deemed to Be Excessively Injurious or to Have Indiscriminate Effects of 1980.


20.2 Any breach of this representation and warranty shall entitle UNDP to terminate this Contract immediately upon notice to the Contractor, without any liability for termination charges or any other liability of any kind of UNDP.

OBSERVANCE OF THE LAW

The Contractor shall comply with all laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations bearing upon the performance of its obligations under the terms of this Contract.

AUTHORITY TO MODIFY

No modification or change in this Contract, no waiver of any of its provisions or any additional contractual relationship of any kind with the Contractor shall be valid and enforceable against UNDP unless provided by an amendment to this Contract signed by the authorized official of UNDP.

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Annex III- Terms of Reference (TOR)

1. Background

The next presidential and provincial council in Afghanistan will be held in 2009. In response to a request from the Government of Afghanistan, the UNDP Afghanistan has developed a programme of technical assistance, which has amongst its objectives the development of an informed electorate.

This will be achieved through assistance to strengthen the overall capacity of the Independent Electoral Commission (IEC) civil society, media, and other agencies critical to the achievement of free and fair elections, and improvement of citizens' participation in the electoral process and understanding of their rights and duties.


The Afghanistan Election Assistance Programme is guided by ten key principles:

1. Harmonisation and complementarity with on-going programmes.
2. Coordination with other actors and implementing partners.
3. Utilisation of local expertise and partnerships and the partnering of local institutions with any external service providers.
4. Local ownership and focus on long term capacity building.
5. A solid research base.
6. Continuous evaluation based on measurable objectives.
7. Programme and budget oversight and information sharing through a Steering Committee and higher level political exchange.
8. Gender equity.
9. Accessibility, especially for the disabled, non-urban dwellers and the illiterate.
10. Accountability through regular programme and budget reporting to IEC, participating agencies and donors.

2. Program Results and Context of Work

Among the objectives of the program are enhanced fair and accurate media reporting on electoral issues evidenced by improved electoral coverage in terms of balance, accuracy, impartiality and fairness, and that citizens have an increased awareness of electoral processes.

Since the last elections, the nature of media in Afghanistan has dramatically evolved with the emergence of many independent media entities and the creation of a large number of smaller locally based media houses. Ownership can impinge on the capacity of journalists and broadcasters to act in accordance with recognized professional standards, and journalists and broadcasters are often required to work in insecure environments often under extreme security threats and in the context of a lack of independence. In addition, many people engaged in the media industry have limited training and limited exposure to the political campaigning and electoral processes.

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While the program has a strong emphasis on media both in encouraging issues-based discussion and debate; in media training and in utilisation of media for voter education, a number of groups are already engaged in media activities including training. The proposed media training activity must be conducted in an environment of collaboration and harmonisation with other on-going media training activities.

A comprehensive media monitoring program will be developed and implemented independently of this media training component of the program the regular findings of which are required to be fed into the media training program.

Collaboration and cooperation with on-going activities is expected of any service provider.

UNDP wishes to engage a specialist organization in the training of media to guide the development and implementation of a national cross-media media training program focused specifically on the election environment, the standards of professionalism expected within the electoral context and in capacity building with local media organizations. This must also include specific training on the voting processes and provision of information of the counting, tallying and announcement procedures. The inclusion of a component on safety and security of journalists will also be required.

Note:


- Proposals will preferably be shaped under a national program to be developed and implemented by one specialist training institution.
- Competence, experience, coordination, consistency, continuity, integration and experience-sharing will be key factors in determining selection of expertise.
- The program is anticipated to be reactivated in 2010.

3. Strengthening of National Capacity through a collaborative process

In acknowledgement of the principles enunciated above, and recognizing the need to strengthen the capacity of national professional institutions and organizations, the consultants specialist(s) will be required to develop and implement the program in collaboration with appropriate professional bodies, and to secure the participation of senior management in the proposed processes.

4. Principal Responsibilities

The successful service provider will conduct a comprehensive Media Training program that addresses the various roles, responsibilities and needs of journalists, editors, and proprietors in Afghanistan, paying particular attention to the importance of geographic reach across the country. Training must address the objective of the achievement of balanced, fair, impartial and accurate reporting of election-related issues including compliance with any existing or newly developed Code of Conduct; equitable access to the media by all parties, and a level playing field in terms of access by women to media, and non-discriminatory reporting.

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Under the guidance of UNDP/ELECT the Media Training Specialist(s) will be required to identify, develop and implement a comprehensive media training program across Afghanistan ensuring access to the program by print, radio and broadcast media representatives in all regions of the country.

5. Specific Responsibilities

The Media Training specialist/s will be required to:

- Identify already existing media training activities and service providers and develop a program that complements but does not duplicate already existing activities;
- Research lessons learned from 2004/5 and ensure that those lessons learned are reflected in the articulation of the 2009 training program;
- Develop a national media training program focused on the training of relevant, identified personnel in the principles of objective, impartial, fair and accurate reporting on electoral issues and which in other ways supports the professionalization of media in electoral and political reporting but which also recognizes the constraints under which media operate in Afghanistan including reference to media ownership and to security issues;
- Develop appropriate training materials, utilizing already existing / published resources as appropriate.
- In collaboration with senior management within media, identify appropriate participants for training and establish guidelines for selection in training programs.
- Liaise closely with the Independent Electoral Commission of Afghanistan (IEC) to ensure that training materials and information accords with voter education information produced by IEC and with the electoral processes of the IEC.
- Liaise closely with Media Monitoring bodies in order to reflect monitoring assessments and recommendations within training programs.
- Implement the training program in accordance with UNDP guidelines in relation to travel, honoraria and other payments and costs associated with the program.
- Recognizing that civil society groups will also be active in civic education activities, develop an training component on media advocacy principles and application of skills in utilising media as a tool or component of education for delivery to NGOs /CSOs through a series of national and regional seminars (maximum of 90).

6. Qualifications and Experience

- Tertiary qualifications in Journalism, Communications, Education, Political Science, or related field.
- A strong background in the development and implementation of training programs is essential.
- At least ten years experience in media as a journalist, editor or public affairs specialist.
- At least five years experience in the coverage of election and / or political issues.
- Knowledge and practical experience of media advocacy processes.



- Excellent written, oral and inter-personal communication skills.
- Proven field experience in Afghanistan
- Knowledge of and access to teaching and research resources is an advantage.
- Fluency in English and Knowledge of Dari/Pashto is essential.
- Cultural awareness and sensitivity is essential.
- Computer literacy in Microsoft Software and IT packages.
- Knowledge of and commitment to the principles and mandate of UNDP

7. Other Attributes

- Be conversant with the structure, scope and reach of media and relevant bodies within Afghanistan and to be especially familiar with those media that are popular, trusted and frequently used sources of information.
- Ability to collect and analyse information and data.
- Ability to work with minimum supervision and in a multicultural setting.
- Ability to work long hours as the job entails working for long hours.
- Willingness to travel widely in Afghanistan as the job may entail extensive travel within the country.

8. Time Scale

- Preliminary scoping and development of monitoring plans should commence immediately on signing of contract.
- The overall duration of the training courses should not exceed six months. The Offerer will present a monthly budget.
- The activity will conclude in end of October 2009.
- An overall M&E Plan will be developed independently by the Programme Management Unit.
- The activity is likely to be reactivated in 2010. Proposals need not demonstrate intent to cover the field comprehensively in 2009 alone.

9. Management Arrangements

- Consultants are expected to provide their own office facilities.
- Media training facilities and equipment will be provided by the consultant organisation(s).
- The successful Offeror are expected to work closely with the UNDP/ELECT.
- This Request for Proposals is for an activity-specific based proposal. The UNDP/ELECT will not fund the establishment of a full time country office for the successful bidder.

10. Reporting

The consultant organisation will be expected to liaise regularly with the UNDP/ELECT and provide monthly progress reports on each major component and submit a comprehensive report at the conclusion of the project. The consultant organization(s) will report to the Chief Electoral Adviser through the UNDP/ELECT Business Centre Manager.
